National Merit Finalists!

It's official! Seniors **Isaac Anderson** and **Samuel Joyce** have been named Finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Program. There are approximately 15,000 Semifinalists that advance to Finalist standing. The winner of Merit Scholarship awards are chosen after an evaluation of each candidate's academic record, information about the school's curricula and grading system, two sets of test scores, the high school official's written recommendation, information about the student's activities and leadership, and the Finalist's own essay. Isaac and Samuel hope to be one of the 7,400 Finalists who are announced starting in March and continuing to mid-June. Finalists may receive monetary scholarship awards.

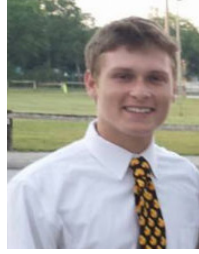
STUDENT News



Tarek Ziad and Anna Lorangeira-IB Seniors

Anna and Tarek are recipients/winners of the **QuestBridge National Match Scholarship**. Tarek will attend Yale with a 4-year scholarship and Anna will attend University of Pennsylvania with a 4-year scholarship. This year, 657 exceptional students hailing from 44 states have been selected as QuestBridge College Match Scholarship Recipients. Students selected for the College Match are “matched” to a partner college—admitted with a guaranteed full, four-year scholarship, including tuition, room and board, and other expenses. This year broke many records: in September, QuestBridge received an all-time high of 13,264 applications from across the country, from which 4,895 were selected as Finalists to continue in the College Match. Please also congratulate **Naomi Bak** (IB Senior) for reaching the semi-finals in this competition.

Tarek and Anna are also the recipients of the **Horatio Alger Scholarship** (**Tarek** at the National level and **Anna** at the State Level). Since 1984, Horatio Alger Association Members and Friends have been funding need-based college scholarships to support deserving young people to overcome their adversity and pursue their dreams through higher education. So far, the Association has awarded more than \$110 million to approximately 20,000 students.



Kevin Solomon-IB Senior

Kevin, SPHS debater, is currently ranked 6th in the country, in Congressional Debate! The ranking is based on points he accrued at tournaments this year. Kevin deserves additional congratulations. He has been selected as a **Barnes Scholarship Finalist**. He will receive money towards his education at an accredited U.S. college or university. Established in 1999, the scholarships are named for Andrew Barnes, former chairman and CEO of the newspaper's parent company, Times Publishing Co. They have been awarded to dozens of high-achieving students who excel despite significant challenges. Barnes scholars have gone on to top-tier schools across the country.



Sam Joyce-IB Senior

Sam made it as far as the Congress finals in U.S. Congressional Debate—a very big accomplishment for SPHS. To add to his successes, Sam has been selected as a candidate for the **U.S. Presidential Scholars Program!**



Amy Diaz-IB Senior

Amy qualified as a National Hispanic Scholar with the National Hispanic Recognition Program (NHRP). This honor went to just 5,000 of the highest-scoring students from over 250,000 Hispanic/Latino juniors who took the 2015 PSAT. Many colleges and universities extend scholarship opportunities to these scholars. In order to qualify for this recognition, the student had to achieve the minimum required PSAT Selection Index score. Additionally, they needed to earn a cumulative GPA of 3.5 or higher by the middle of junior year.



Naomi Miller-IB Junior

Naomi was one of 100 winners from 1200 applicants of the Inaugural Emperor Science Award. The purpose of this award is to encourage students to explore careers in cancer research and care. Award-winning applicants demonstrated awareness of cancer research developments and their own research interests. Naomi will receive a computer, a stipend, and an exciting opportunity to be mentored by a cancer researcher for 3 months this Spring.



Jordan Kriseman-IB Senior

Jordan has studied and competed in traditional Irish step dancing for 12 years. She has competed locally, regionally and nationally (three times at the North American Nationals in Orlando, Montreal, Ca., and Providence, R.I.). In October, Jordan was selected by her teacher Stephen Scariff of the Scariff School of Irish Dance in Tampa to compete at the All Ireland Championships in Killarney, Ireland. Jordan danced a traditional set, a soft shoe piece and a hard shoe round. In December, she competed at her eighth regional competition in Dallas, placing 13th in the Southern Region and qualifying once again for Nationals in Orlando this June. In addition to competing, Jordan also has danced locally during the St. Patrick's Day season at private events, pubs and festivals, as well as on live television for "Good Day Tampa Bay" on WTVT Fox 13 and Bay News 9. She also was invited to dance with the Florida Orchestra in 2014 and The Celts of Nashville, Tenn., in 2015 when they performed at the Straz Theater in Tampa. Jordan hopefully plans to continue competing at least through her first year in college.



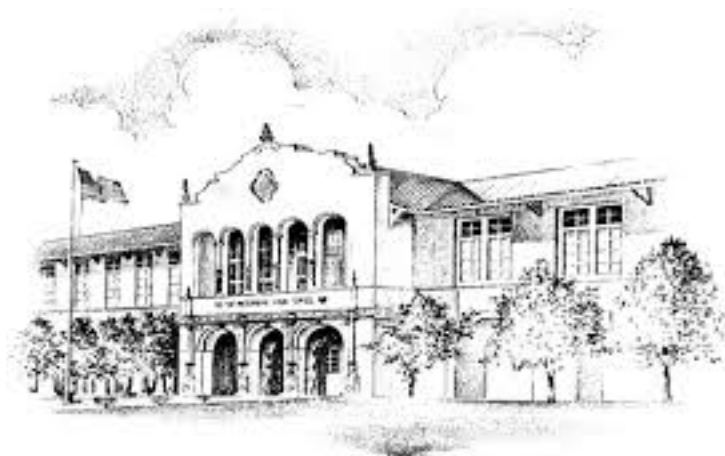
W. Reid Carlisle-IB Junior

Reid achieved the rank of Eagle Scout this past May. He is a member of Boy Scout Troop 219 at St. Raphael's Catholic Church. For his Eagle Project, Reid created a "Unity Garden" including four foxtail palm trees, irrigation and a 30' flag pole at Azalea Little League, "Where everybody plays". He held two yard sales and received donations, raising over \$5,000 for the project and had over \$1,000 left to donate to Azalea Little League. The project took over 500 hours of volunteer time. Reid was inspired to do his project by his younger brother who has played in both the Miracle and Challenger Leagues at Azalea. Reid is also a member of the Order of the Arrow Brotherhood, earned 36 merit badges and the 50 Miler and Den Chief Awards. Reid is also active in the Key Club, Math Honor Society and Science National Honor Society.



Siena London-IB Freshman

Siena has been riding English Hunt Seat for seven years and has competed successfully on the "A" circuit for the last three years. Currently she is showing in the 3' equitation and hunter divisions in Zone 4 of USEF (United States Equestrian Federation). Siena recently completed the USEF Lettering Program, earning the equivalent of a Varsity letter in the sport. Her horse, Apollo, is a 17.1 hand Hanoverian gelding. Siena's goals include qualifying for the Marshall and Sterling Insurance League Finals that take place in Saugerties, NY. In the longer term, she hopes to continue to balance her sport with her academics and to earn a spot on a NCAA Division I college equestrian team.

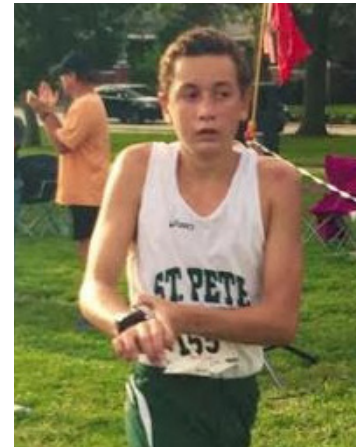
Tennis

When you were in high school, what did you imagine your profession to be? What inspired you to teach high school? Respond as if this were a tweet... #140characters

Mr. Halstead: I never thought I'd teach, yet alone teach in the IB program when I was in High School. However, I am very glad that my career path brought me back to SPHS IB, working with so many wonderful young people.

Mr. Rader: Either a lawyer or scientist. Microbiology was my first major. Life kept landing me teaching/tutoring jobs and I enjoyed the satisfaction of reaching kids who struggled to learn.

Mrs. Vann: In high school I wanted to be a talk-show host...I often say that books saved me—and they did. Alone in an adolescent world filled with fear, pain, and confusion, I saw my deepest and most secret feelings and thoughts articulated by Shakespeare, Eugene O'Neil, and William Faulkner. Once, long ago, I had an English teacher who opened these books for me---and I teach to repay that debt.

Mr. Smith: In 7th grade, I wanted to become an airline pilot. My guidance counsellor told me that most airline pilots came from the military. That day I decided I would join the Air Force. After a 21 year career in the Military, with degrees in Engineering and Military History, as I awaited a position with the airlines, I did some substitute teaching and was having a ball. I went from what Forbes magazine deems one of the most overpaid professions (airline pilot) to what they deem the most underpaid profession (school teacher). The rest is history... actually math and physics. While I never got to live out my 7th grade dream, I've never regretted any of my decisions... well, except sometimes while grading IAs.

Mrs. Farias: I wanted to be a school teacher since the age of 6. When I was in high school I wanted to follow the Grateful Dead and sell veggie burritos out of a van.

Mrs. Ladd: In 6th grade I had Mr. Heck, an incredible math teacher who made math come alive for me. That is the year I decided to be a math teacher, because I wanted to be like Mr. Heck. It wasn't till I got to

high school math, that I decided to teach at the high school level. Math didn't come easy to me, but I loved the solving of what I considered puzzles. At that point, I never looked back and thought about any other career. In college, I had a clear focus, and never wavered. Since then, I have never regretted my decision. The students and teachers at St. Pete are amazing and I am blessed to work with them.

Mr. Maxwell: Thought I'd be a judge...plan was in place. Life happened...saw my passion elsewhere because of two incredible professors at UF #livingthedream

Mrs. Torres: #lawyerwannabe

Mrs. Jamison: When in high school I wanted to be a lawyer or a psychologist (counselor). In graduate school I prepared to get a counseling license but found in my internships that I was always assigned to the educational component of therapy, such as teaching people about alcoholism and liked this role. The best things in life are serendipitous, and I added a teaching certificate to my degrees.

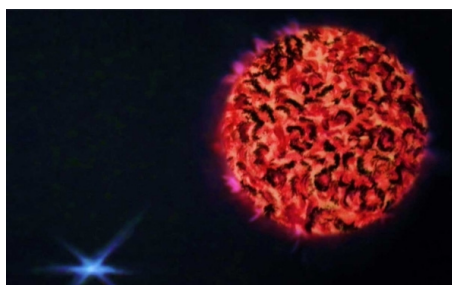
Eric Tong '12

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SHOWCASE OF ACHIEVEMENT CATEGORIES

ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT - This award recognizes an individual who consistently demonstrated high academic achievement including grades, creativity, critical thinking, classroom participation, and other behaviors that contribute to excellence in scholarship.

SCHOLAR ATHLETE - This award goes to an athlete who also proves to be a scholar with awards, honors, newspaper articles describing athletic ability, etc., as well as a minimum of 3.0 GPA, and involvement in school-community activities. Athletics includes baseball, basketball, bowling, competitive cheer, cross country, football, golf, gymnastics, ice hockey, lacrosse, soccer, softball, swimming and diving, tennis, track and field, volleyball, wrestling, and more.

CITIZENSHIP OR LEADERSHIP - This award goes to the nominee who has proven outstanding dedication and service to church, school, community, civic organizations, government, and citizens. Leadership can be demonstrated through courage and tolerance; inspiring others through actions, words, support, or example; acceptance and understanding of differences; and by maintaining high standards in difficult situations.

VISUAL ARTS - This award recognizes skills in the visual arts field, both media and fine arts, including ceramics, sculpture, glass work, metal, jewelry design, painting, photography, ink/pencil sketches, as well as video, film, graphic arts and design, computer graphics, computer animation, web design, video game design, or audio (soundtrack, radio script). Samples should be limited to eight items or a five minute video.

LITERARY ARTS - Recognition for this award goes to the individual for writing a short story, novel, poetry, prose, screen and/or playwriting. Samples should be limited to eight items.

PERFORMING ARTS - This award recognizes the individual who has submitted a sample of talents through a video or audio piece (up to five minutes) with any of the following: dramatic interpretation (theater, pantomime, spoken word), music (voice or instrument), dance (ballet, tap, jazz, modern, etc.), modeling, martial arts, magic, etc.

SCIENCE & TECHNOLOGY - This recognition goes to the individual who demonstrates working knowledge of computers (software or hardware), robotics, biology, chemistry, ecology, marine biology, oceanography, or physics. Samples should be limited to eight items.

OVERCOMING ADVERSITY - This award will recognize an individual with a disability, illness, or other condition, who has overcome limitations and found ways to excel in the face of adversity.
