Three Named National Merit Semifinalists

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation announced the names of approximately 16,000 Semifinalists in the 62nd annual National Merit Scholarship Program. We are proud to announce that three St. Petersburg High School students were named as National Merit Semifinalists, all of which are enrolled in the International Baccalaureate Program. Congratulations to Naomi Miller, Bryan Peebles and Jay Shah. They will be eligible to compete for more than 8,000 scholarships valued at \$35 million that will be offered next spring. There were 12 total semifinalists in the city of St. Petersburg, and SPHS had the highest

number of winners in a public school.

About 1.5 million juniors in more than 22,000 high schools entered the 2016 National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the 2015 Preliminary SAT/ National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test, which served as an initial screen of program entrants. The nationwide pool of Semifinalists, representing less than one percent of U.S. high school seniors, includes the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

About 15,000 students nationwide are expected to advance to the Finalist level in February. There will be 7,500 finalists

selected sometime between March and June, and they will receive scholarship money. We wish Naomi, Brian and Jay continued success in their academic pursuits.

Additionally, another three IB Seniors were named as **Commended Students** for their academic promise. Although they will not continue in the 2016 competition for National Merit Scholarships, Commended Students placed among the top five percent of more than 1.5 million students who took the 2015 PSAT. They are: **Caitlin Becker, Conlan Hale,** and **Romina Lilollari.**





Laura Domanski Receives Yale Educator Award

Laura Domanski, SPHS IB Chemistry teacher, was named the recipient of the 2016 Yale Educator Award.

Sponsored by the Yale Office of Undergraduate Admissions, the award recognizes teachers and counselors from around the world who inspire and support their students to perform at high levels and to achieve excellence. **Tarek Ziad** ('16), IB graduate and member of the Yale Class of 2020, nominated Domanski, who received a letter and engraved desk set from Yale.

Admission office officials at Yale said that they credit the excellent quality of this year's freshman class to teachers and



counselors like Domanski who have been shaping students long before they arrive at Yale.

Smart Board Drive

You can participate in our *first ever* technology drive so we can purchase Smart Boards for our IB teachers. So, what is a "smart board?"

This electronic device replaces the traditional chalkboard. It serves as a screen, chalkboard and projector all in one and allows teachers to save and print notes. It has the capacity to highlight and annotate projected documents and is equipped with an interactive touch screen. This tool is becoming an essential component of every classroom. All forms of media can be used on the board, and this will expand the range of content to which teachers expose our students.



By donating money directly to the IB program for this fund-raising effort, we will be able to keep our teachers current with trends in education. At our school, we currently have a few Smart Boards within the IB program and we have requests from **five** of our IB teachers who

The Santa Parade is also a great pay-it-forward opportunity by handing out candy and beads to excited children along the parade route.



WELCOME, NEW IB FACULTY

A native of Wisconsin, **Ms. Marsha Carlson** brings 36 years of experience as a math teacher to her new role at SPHS IB. She is teaching all Honors Algebra II classes this year, and is excited to work with the International Baccalaureate program for the first time.



After graduating from the University of Northern Iowa, Ms. Carlson taught for 20

years in Wisconsin. Feeling like she needed a change, she moved down to sunny Florida and continued her work as a math instructor in varied schools and settings around the Tampa Bay area. "At first, I tried a job at a middle school for a change, thinking maybe I can help them get better prepared for high school, but found that middle school is just not my thing." So Ms. Carlson returned to her first love, teaching math to high school students, first at Jefferson High School's magnet program for International Studies in Tampa, and then at Seminole High School in Pinellas County. Last year she was invited to interview at SPHS for an opening in Honors Algebra.

In teaching all of the freshmen this year, she finds that she most enjoys helping them make the transition to high school methods of study. "I'm trying to take them from where they were [at the start] and move them up to the rigor of where they should be."

Ms. Carlson is also pleased with the temperament of the students. "The kids are so nice, they thank me every day. They are excited about learning, and they work so hard. When there's a little problem, they're eager to come in and get help. I want to establish their study skills and teach them how to think. They don't have to be told how to do every problem, but they have to be able to use their reasoning skills. That's what is going to get them through the IB program. So that's my challenge this year."

"The kids energize me," she concludes. "At least, until I get home!"



Mr. Alberto Cano, our new senior Spanish teacher, hails directly from Madrid, Spain, and his cosmopolitan upbringing has helped him bring a uniquely qualified approach to the International Baccalaureate program.

His father traveled a lot, bringing his family with him. Early on, it was decided that Mr. Cano and his siblings would go to an international

school that taught in the French language, to better equip them for a life of travel. Because of his early exposure to different countries and cultures, he became increasingly interested in learning about languages. As Mr. Cano grew older, he picked up English, Japanese, and German as well.

"When I was 16, my father was sent to work in Washington," says Mr. Cano, "so we all came here and switched from French school to an American high school."

After a time in Germany, Mr. Cano returned to the U.S. to attend college at the University of North Texas, earning a Master's in ESL. He returned to Spain and taught English for the next seven years, but America beckoned once again. So he returned to the States to teach at public and private schools in Texas, New Jersey, and now Florida.

After teaching at Pinellas Park High for six years, he is excited to finally be working in the IB program that he has heard so much about.

"IB was something I've always wondered about, given my life as a young kid traveling around. It fit my philosophy of life and my outlook on the world. It's a good place to offer what I know, and also learn a lot too. It always goes both ways."

When not in the classroom, Mr. Cano is happy to spend time with his extended family, including his siblings who have also settled in the States, plus more family back in Spain. He likes to read in a variety of languages and ride his motorcycle.

Ms. Kate Munkittrick

teaches both English and Inquiry Skills to most of the freshman this year. A native of St. Petersburg, she arrived at teaching via a circuitous route as she came into her own exploring the many options that suited her wide range of talents and interests.

While attending Gibbs High School, she grew restless with the slower pace and courses



that weren't as challenging as she'd hoped. So she left high school early to attend New College in Sarasota, Florida. Ms. Munkittrick has a natural talent and affinity for music, particularly opera, so in time she transferred to Florida State, where they had a robust music program. Majoring in music, she says, "was a lot of fun, but it didn't point towards being a career choice," so she eventually wound up taking the LSAT and completing law school at the University of Florida.

For the next eight years, Ms. Munkittrick practiced as a civil defense attorney, specializing in insurance defense. But something was missing. "I realized I spent a lot of time arguing, or sitting alone in my car driving to trial, or sitting alone at the computer researching for my cases." She wanted to do something cooperative with other people.

As her mother, Mrs. Gaye Burnsed, was already the anatomy teacher

here at SPHS, she decided to give teaching a go, working at first as a long term substitute for English. This year she has her own classes, and she pronounces it "a perfect fit. I'm loving it."

Outside of school, Ms. Munkittrick still keeps up with music, singing in a local a capella group called Concordia. She also has two children, ages 5 and 2.

As for her students, "I have been so pleasantly surprised by the freshmen. They have been engaged, and they love to talk about everything. It's been so fun."



Mr. Drake Polino is the new Physics teacher here at SPHS, bringing lots of youthful and fun energy to his classes.

He is a graduate of the University of Florida, with a Bachelor of Science in Physics, as well as a minor in Education. He is excited for his new teaching position which allows him to pass on everything he's learned.

"I've wanted to be a physics teacher for a few years now, and I'm overjoyed to be a part of IB," he says. "I think we're off to a great start!"

When he's not busy with his students at SPHS, he finds time to pursue hobbies and interests befitting a science teacher, some of which will surely be relatable to the students. "I'm a huge nerd and absolutely love Star Wars," he says. "I'm also a gamer and enjoy world war history."

But perhaps the biggest joy in his life and the apple of his eye is his

new baby, Liliana, 9 months of age. "I have a darling daughter. She's the whole reason I was looking for a job down here!"

Ms. Amy Swanson is a native of St. Petersburg and is also a graduate of St. Pete High IB! After earning her IB diploma, she attended the University of Miami ("Go Canes!").

After graduating, she returned to her high school alma mater and is teaching a full complement of classes:



Freshman pre-DP US History, English II (traditional), and US History Honors (traditional).

In her time off, Ms. Swanson likes to bake and cook, go to concerts and plays, read, and spend time with her friends and family. Lately, though, her free time has been mostly spent preparing a nursery for a new addition to her family.

Ms. Swanson is also excited for her new students, and is enjoying her first full-time teaching role here at SPHS. LEAVING SCHOOL

If your child needs to leave school early, please write and sign a note stating the date and time they need to leave and have your child take the note to the IB Office <u>at the</u> <u>beginning of the school day</u>. Ms. Derrickson will then issue a PTL (Pass to Leave) that your child will give to the teacher when it's time to leave. In an emergency, please call the IB Office and speak with someone directly (please do not leave a voicemail) to request for your student to leave.

Mentoring sessions range from 30-60 minutes and occur at the school during school hours. The days and times of mentoring sessions are arranged between the mentor and mentee depending on their individual schedules. As a result, mentoring is convenient for both students and mentors. The Extended Essay (EE) and How to Get an "A"

(Advice from Those who Did!)

Listen up Juniors! The EE is a 4000 word research paper that is an IB requirement and at SPHS, written in the second semester of junior year and into the summer. Student must score a grade of \mathbf{A} , \mathbf{B} , \mathbf{C} or \mathbf{D} on the paper. A grade of \mathbf{E} will mean they cannot earn an IB Diploma. In the class of 2016 (104 students), 10 students earned an \mathbf{A} grade on their EE. We asked them to share some advice for current students. Congratulations to these students!

Maja Haerle wrote her EE in Chemistry:

- Communication with your advisor is very important.
- I'm lucky that I was genuinely interested in and passionate about my topic because I had to invest a lot of time into studying the topic before I could write about it.
- Looking at sample EEs helped guide me in the early stage of research and planning.
- The EE overall was a worthwhile experience.

Tucker DeGregory – English

- Be certain that you pick a subject that you're in love with, rather than one that you think you'll score well in.
- Brainstorm interesting ideas when you're first asked to come up with topics, as advisors are quick to deny you if your proposals are weak and generic.
- Showing interest in writing your EE in a specific subject area before your official proposal sheet is due is super beneficial, the faculty advisor is then already aware that you're passionate about your topic.
- Generate a question about something that's near and dear to your heat, but not one that you can already answer. If you know the conclusion or it can be found in a number of existing publications don't write about it or your essay will be lackluster and your grader will see no progression of research or exploration.
- Writing the EE provides an opportunity to extend yourself as a student and person. It was even a subject for one of my college application essays!

Ivana Radosavljevic- Chemistry

- Pick a topic you actually find interesting.
- The background research assignment assigned in junior year was a LIFE SAVER. If you do a good job on it, you have essentially finished one fourth of your paper.
- The key to a good conclusion is being passionate enough about your topic to think critically about what you have learned and done and what it means.
- I loved the EE process, of course, I complained about it, but overall I loved it.
- I felt like a scientist, it was awesome to be creating something from start to finish on my own.

Jordan Kriseman – History

- I think the EE ended up being one of the things, if not the one thing, I was most proud of after completing IB. I felt confident in my essay and when I looked online in July at my scores, seeing the A was thrilling!
- I gained a lot through writing this and it gives me great confidence in myself going into college as an art history major, that I have great writing and researching skills.
- I think being so genuinely interested in the topic helps, instead of writing 4000 meaningless words, you write 4000 words on a topic that you enjoy learning about and that betters you as a person.

Sam Joyce – History

- I enjoyed the research process, I think it comes down to selecting a topic you enjoy.
- After that it came down to spending a lot of time at the USF library figuring out what to say.

Sead Alisic – History

- If you don't practice communication with your advisor you're really only debilitating yourself.
- Citations! Don't compile your resources and write and then go back and cite. Really, it's a bad idea. If you do them as you go through it becomes extremely easy.
- No harm was done in spending more time to cite a resource, it could have been plagiarism if it wasn't cited correctly.
- Don't use a citation machine. If you do them by hand you will not only be better off, but it is actually faster when you memorize your style of citations. You can tell the difference between manually done and computer generated citations.
- The EE was a pretty worthwhile experience that shaped me into a better student. You learn your boundaries and learn from your mistakes.
- Writing this big paper makes all the other ones seem pretty small in comparison, which is always a win.



Teaching "TechnoStressed" Students

In her recent essay "And Their Eyes Glazed Over," Joelle Renstrom summarized research on students' frequent engagement with their digital devices and described the profound impacts she sees on students in her classes at Boston University.

The terms "Fear of Missing Out" (FOMO) and "TechnoStressed" reflect the compulsion to check one's device. Research studies, some of which have collected students' self-reports, are documenting the costs of multi-tasking (e.g. texting or checking social media while in class or working). Renstrom sees deleterious effects on her students' attention, focus, interest, engagement, time management, learning, and critical thinking.


Theatre News
