From the IB Director

Parents and Students,

It's hard to believe summer is almost over and the start of school is just around the corner! Our Class of 2013 performed very well on their IB exams and 90% earned the IB Diploma. I'm also excited to welcome 157 new freshmen to the IB Program, many of whom attended our IB Boot Camp and are ready to get started!

We are excited to welcome the following new teachers to the IB Program: Mr. Chris Lindenburg will be teaching Pre-DP Biology; Mr. Brandon Rader—Pre-DP World History; Dr. Susan Robinson—IB Music; and Mrs. Clara Sager-IB Spanish. You will learn more about these teachers in the next edition of *The Advocate*.

This year there will be no early release on Wednesdays and the school day for all students will begin at 7:05 a.m. and end at 1:35 p.m. daily. However, while traditional students will have a straight 7 period day, the IB students will follow an A-B-C Day rotation schedule. This schedule has been used with great success at Palm Harbor IB for many years and provides students with more time spent in fewer classes each day.

Another benefit of this schedule is the Study Skills and Critical Thinking (SSCT) class, which will take the place of DS without taking time from academic courses. It will be a dedicated class period, with underclassmen having one block (two 45-minute

periods) of SSCT per three day rotation. Juniors and seniors will have two blocks per three day rotation.

Freshmen will be coached, as usual, by Mrs. Karyn Tash, and Ms. Susan Domanski and Mr. Craig Thompson will continue to coach the sophomore class. Juniors and seniors will be assigned one of their SSCT teachers as their academic coach. Other advantages of the SSCT period are that the SSCT teacher/coach may "prescribe" that students pre- and/or re-sit academic classes during SSCT. Additionally, students may also have the opportunity to meet with subject teachers for extra help during their SSCT class.

I'm sure we will experience a few bumps in scheduling along the way, so please be patient with us as we implement this new exciting schedule. I feel like it will be very advantageous for the success of IB students.

Students will need to be mindful of their attendance. If a student misses more than 4 days *in any one period*, he or she will be unable to exempt ANY exams. Since the classes are longer it is important that students are in school every day!

Following are a few reminders as we start the new year:

LEAVING SCHOOL

If your child needs to leave school early please send a note with your child and instruct him or her to

take the note to the IB Office in the morning. Mrs. Derrickson will issue the PTL at that time, and then all your child has to do is present the PTL to the teacher when it's time to go. It is very difficult for us to get students out of class on short notice.

DRESS CODE

This year the dress code will be priority number 1! Each day will begin with a Dress Code Check. Students out of compliance will be sent to the IB Office to call home for a change of clothes and then sent to the IC Room until the new clothes are brought to school. Students who have chronic dress code violations will be issued a Disciplinary Referral. Please be sure your student is in compliance with the Pinellas County School Dress Code. There is more information on the code in this issue of the *Advocate*.

Finally, I ask that you please consider becoming a member of the IB Booster Parent Organization. The financial and volunteer support of IB Boosters is what makes our program special. My goal is 100% membership in each class. If you want to get involved in the IB Program, please consider joining one of our standing committees. Thank you for choosing St. Pete High IB, and have a great school year!

Academic Achievement

NATIONAL ESSAY WINNER: From among nearly 4000 entrants, **IB Senior Noelle Rutland** took first place in the Stossel in the Classroom “No They Can’t” essay contest. Based upon television commentator John Stossel’s book, *No They Can’t*, and his related

television program, the contest asks students to address whether Stossel is correct that a *free people and free markets do a better job of solving problems than government does*.

Noelle received an all-expense paid trip to New York City, where she appeared on Stossel’s one-hour program, Stossel, on the Fox Business Network. IB English teacher Sarah VanDuyne, who submitted Noelle’s essay, also received this trip.

MERIT SCHOLARSHIP: IB Senior **Brent Begamy** was named a \$2,500 National Merit Scholarship recipient last week, one of only 2,500 winners nationally and the only one from Pinellas County. Winners were chosen from 15,000 finalists in the 2013 National Merit Scholarship Program. A selection committee assessed students’ grades, the difficulty of the subjects they studied, standardized test scores and participation in school activities. The winners in each state



were judged to have “the strongest combination of accomplishments, skills and potential for success in rigorous college studies.”



ACADEMIC CHALLENGE: Pinellas County took top honors at the statewide Commissioner’s Academic Challenge in mid-April. Of the six team members, three are SPHS IB students: **Seniors Eric Mulligan and Solomon Howard** (third and fifth from left); and **Junior Nick Walker** (far left). SPHS faculty member Tracy Keim, the SPHS team sponsor, coached the county team along with a teacher from Seminole High School.

SPANISH SCHOLARSHIP: IB Senior Eliza Fixler received a \$1000 scholarship for outstanding achievement in Spanish from the Sociedad Honoraria Hispánica.

GOODWILL AMBASSADOR: IB Junior Tien Weber was selected to serve as a goodwill ambassador this summer to St. Petersburg’s sister city of Takamatsu, Japan. Tien received round-trip airfare to Japan, where she will stay with host families for three weeks. As ambassador, Tien will inform the Japanese about life and culture here, and she will make a presentation on her visit to the Mayor and City Council of St. Petersburg.

HISTORY EXCELLENCE: IB Freshman Alexandria Witherspoon took first place in the individual website category at the Florida State History Fair.

POYNTER INTERNSHIP: IB Sophomore Robert Richardson received a summer internship with the Poynter Institute.

ALUMNI NEWS

Shane Crutchfield, IB Class of 2012 just finished her freshman year at Xavier University, where she was recognized as the Colonial Athletic Association’s (CAA) Rookie of the Year in women’s golf. She also made the CAA Tournament Team and was named 1st Team All Conference.

Eric Tong, valedictorian of the IB Class of 2012, received a Summer Undergraduate Research Fellowship and a University Scholars Program Summer Enhancement Grant to work full-time this summer at Columbia University Cell Engineering Lab. Eric, who just completed his freshman year at Columbia, will be working to help develop tissue-engineered cartilage which will eventually be used to replace worn cartilage in osteoarthritic patients.

Additionally, last semester Eric competed in the Columbia Undergraduate Venture Competition and won a spot in the Summer Startup Session. Through this program, he and his partner hope to develop their idea to a minimal viable product stage.

Kelly Vasbinder, IB Class of 2011, is one of just 127 students nationwide to receive a prestigious Ernest F. Hollings scholarship from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Kelly just finished her sophomore year at Florida State University, where she is working towards her degree in Biology with a Certificate of Marine Biology and a Chemistry minor. She wants to work in the research of fish populations and has been working in a research lab on sponges for the past three semesters.

Lydia Franzek, IB Class of 2010, graduated from the University of

Florida in May and was awarded the Hauptman Medal for the Most Outstanding Major in Spanish.

SPEAKING

SPHS ETHICS TEAM NATIONAL CHAMPS: St. Petersburg High School’s Ethics Bowl team is the 2013 NATIONAL CHAMPION Team, emerging victorious at the first ever National High School Ethics Bowl at the Parr Center for Ethics at the University of North Carolina in April. At the event, SPHS competed against teams from all over the country and went undefeated through the entire tournament of 4 preliminary rounds, a semi-final and a final round. Team members, all IB seniors, are **Deividas (David) Gustainis, Harsha Kuchampudi, Jared Morgenstein, and Caroline Wallace**.

SPHS DEBATER IN NATION’S TOP 12: IB Senior Caroline Wallace is the first debater from SPHS to reach the finals at the Tournament of Champions, considered to be the most competitive high school tournament in the country. Only 12 debaters made the finals of Caroline’s event, Student Congress.

In order to qualify for the TOC, which is held at the University of Kentucky in late April, a debater must reach the semi-final or final round of at least two national-level tournaments. Caroline had four qualifying bids. **IB Junior Saagar Gupta and IB Freshman Sam Joyce** also qualified with two bids each and also competed in Student Congress.

ATHLETICS

POLE VAULTING TO THE GOLD:

IB Senior Cayman Ellis, regional champion in the pole vault, tied for first place at the Florida Class 4A Track and Field State Championship in May. He was Pinellas County's only first place winner. Other IB students qualifying for states were **Senior Sam Chandler** (3200 meters) and **Freshman Rayven Kirkland** (4 x 100 girls' relay).

FOR LEADERS ON AND OFF THE FIELD: IB Junior Grant Gramling,

a member of the SPHS football team, was selected to participate in the 2nd Annual NFL-Wharton Prep Leadership Program at The University of Pennsylvania in June. Grant is just one of only 32 students selected for this honor from a nationwide application process.

PERFORMING ARTS

ORCHESTRA LANDS ON A

HIGH NOTE: In SPHS' first-ever performance at the State Orchestra Festival, the SPHS Orchestra received an overall Superior rating (the highest award given) from a panel of collegiate

orchestra directors. In addition, they were the only orchestra from Pinellas County to qualify and perform at the event. Don't Skirt the Dress Code This Year!

While the dress code for 2013-14 school year has not changed from last year, this year it will be strictly enforced! Please keep this handy for those back-to-school shopping trips! And when in doubt, ask before you attire!

ITEMS THAT ARE ALLOWED

- Shirts and blouses which completely cover the midriff, back, sides and undergarments (including bra straps)
- Shorts and skirts that are mid-thigh length or longer
- Trousers, pants and shorts worn at the waist and completely covering all undergarments (including boxer shorts)
- Safe and appropriate footwear

ITEMS THAT ARE NOT ALLOWED

- Visible undergarments (including bra straps and boxer shorts)
- Short-shorts and miniskirts (shorter than mid-thigh)
- Tank tops and any other type of shirt that does NOT have sleeves that cover the shoulder
- Pajamas or sleepwear of any type

- Hats/Bandanas/Sweatbands/Sunglasses
- Clothing with inappropriate holes or rips
- Spandex/Leotards/Leggings MUST be worn with proper covering outergarments
- Clothing/Jewelry/Tattoos with: Profanity, Violent Images, Sexually Suggestive Phrases or Images, Gang Related Symbols, Alcohol, Tobacco or Drug Depictions including advertisements for such products
- Hoodies, when the hood is up covering your head

IB CALENDAR NOTES

*6.16 RELIGIOUS HOLIDAY EXEMPTIONS

(1) In order to prevent a conflict between participation in religious observances and participation in public school attendance in grades kindergarten through 12, a student shall be exempt from attendance for a day or days, or for a period of time on a day, designated by the School Board as a religious holiday.

(2) The School Board shall approve a list of religious holidays on which student absence from school shall be allowed when the annual school calendar is adopted. The Superintendent (or designee) is authorized to add religious holidays to the list when presented with documentation establishing

the existence of a legitimate religious holiday.

(3) The parent or guardian of a student who is to be absent on such a religious holiday shall provide to the principal or a designated school administrator, at least three (3) days prior to the absence, a signed notice of the student's intent to be absent. The notice shall contain the name and address of the student to be absent and the date and/or time of the absence.

(4) The principal and teachers at each school shall plan examination, study, and assignments so that no undue hardship is imposed upon the student exempted from attendance to observe a religious holiday. No testing of any kind or major reviews

shall take place on a religious holiday recognized by the School Board.

(5) A student shall have the opportunity to make up any examination, study, or assignment which has been missed because of absence for observance of a religious holiday or because the tenets of the student's religion forbid secular activity at such time.

(6) The principals and teachers at each school shall be responsible for making available to the student so exempted the examination, study, or assignment which has been missed and no special fees shall be charged for such opportunity.
