Character Trait of the Month This month's character trait is Honesty. As I am sure you are aware, kids will sometimes lie. Parents often wonder how they should handle it when their child lies to them. Here are a few helpful tips about lying:

•First of all, know that ALL kids experiment with stretching the truth. (Here's a little secret -adults do, too!) It doesn't necessarily mean your child is going to grow up to be a con artist. •It's developmentally pretty normal for a child to experiment with lying in order to achieve a desired outcome. It's our job as adults to use these situations to teach children that honesty truly is the best policy! •Don't set your child up for failure. If you know they lied about something, don't ask them a question as a trap. Be honest yourself and let them know that you are aware of the situation and you're wondering why they felt a lie was the best choice at the time. This will allow for you to process the situation together and use it as a teachable moment about why honesty is important. •Help the child see lying as an index of maturity. You can do this by saying, "When I feel lied to, it makes me wonder if you are mature enough to handle some of the privileges you enjoy like using the tablet/computer or playing video games." •Using empathy, let the child know privileges will return when maturity goes up. "The good news is that when you can prove to me that you are more mature, I'll know that it's time for you to have these privileges again." •Remember that parenting doesn't have to be like a jury trial. There's no need to prove guilt beyond a reasonable doubt if you think your child has lied. Trust your heart and say things like, "All I know is that I feel lied to, and I know your life will be a lot happier when you don't leave people feeling that way."

Developing a Growth Mindset in Your Child Starts with You!

As parents, you play a huge role in influencing the mindset of your children, so it's important for you to model a growth mindset for your children. Showing your children that you are excited by challenges, see mistakes as learning opportunities, and understand the value of practice and trying different strategies will go a long way in cultivating their growth mindsets!

Understanding Mindsets

A growth mindset is the underlying belief that abilities can be developed through effort and practice. Children with a growth mindset persist in the face of challenges because they understand that effort and hard work can change ability and intelligence. A fixed mindset is the belief that intelligence is static, and cannot be changed. When children have a fixed mindset, they tend to give up easily when they encounter obstacles, because they believe that they don't have what it takes to learn hard things.
